# KRISTA'S CORNER

MINISTER'S NOTES FROM REV. KRISTA TAVES



Does Unitarian Universalism have a theology?

Some Unitarian Universalists use the word “theology” reluctantly because there is so much baggage connected to that word. Traditional definitions of theology revolve around this idea of the study of God. To do theology is to study God. Well, that word is pretty loaded too. And, some Unitarian Universalists don't find the word “God” to be all that meaningful to them. Even those who do use the word God in their lives often experience and understand God in ways that other religions might deem heretical.

There's another reason we often use the word “theology” reluctantly in connection with “Unitarian Universalism.” Some will say that we have so many theologies that we cannot have A Unitarian Universalist Theology.

Unitarian Universalists like Rev. Daniel O'Connell say,

“Enough!” We're letting semantics get in the way of being a religion. We're letting our knee jerk reactions stop us from being all that we can be. We have bigger fish to fry. We have such a powerful message. Why not use absolutely everything at our disposal to get out our message of freedom and unconditional love to those hungry for it. We have lives to save!

To which I say, “Say it again brother!”

I have seen so many people come here and say, “This is what I need!” “My kids are asking questions I can't answer.” “I can't speak freely to my co-workers or neighbors. My ideas are so different from theirs! Here I can be myself.” “You mean to say there's a church that isn't going to call me a sinner or damn me to hell if I don't believe exactly what they expect me to believe?”

Most of the churches around us will say that theology is the Word made Flesh; Revelation comes from above and was embodied in the person of Jesus who was God's son. We say that theology is the Flesh made Word. Revelation comes from our lives and becomes Word in the many ways we come to understand the bigger meaning of our experience. Your children's questions are theology. Your

answers are theology. Your insights and experience are theology. The covenants we make to each other are theology.

Practicing Unitarian Universalism is making Word from Flesh and that's a pretty amazing and liberating theology.

### What is Vespers and what happens there?

Vespers simply means "evening service." Usually a vespers service is more meditative and quiet than what you would find on a Sunday morning. Vespers services are very common in Catholic, Orthodox, Lutheran and Episcopalian churches. However, Protestant and Unitarian Universalist churches have also begun their own Vespers traditions. The concept of Vespers is simple. It is a quiet time to come together and commune with the holy or sacred as you experience it. In Unitarian Universalist churches, Vespers services have a strong emphasis on silence. There are readings. There is time for meditation and prayer. Prayer is done in a way that allows people from a variety of spiritual disciplines to find meaning and value in the words that are spoken. Emerson's Vesper Services are held on the last Wednesday of the month at 7 p.m.

We hold an informal collection to provide child care for the service so that all may attend. We are exploring the possibility of holding a second monthly Vespers Service in St. Charles County. If you live in St. Charles County and would be more likely to attend were a service held closer to home, do let us know. If there is sufficient interest, we will work to make that happen. ### Emerson Covenant Groups Invite New Members.

Emerson's Covenant Groups, our program of small group ministry, welcomes new members. Groups of up to ten people meet once or twice a month with a focus on deep listening and sharing personal experiences. Prepared session plans are used to guide each session, with topics such as forgiveness, gratitude, or saying good bye. Groups also do service projects for the church and community. Participants find that they get to know themselves, and often others, more deeply in these small groups. ### RE VIEW

In what turned out to be a memorable and very successful event, our RE Committee worked together with Adult RE and Community Service to organize a church-wide Social Justice project on November 23 – this was after press time for the December issue of the Emissary, so I'm only just reporting on it now. After our Bread Communion, we got together to make 100 bag lunches for the Salvation Army Harbor Lights. We had such enthusiasm for the project that we went completely overboard. Victor Paglisotti, who delivered the bags to the Salvation Army, estimates we made between 150 and 200 bags. People seemed to enjoy the project very much, and there is some talk of making this an annual event. We in the Children and Youth Religious Education Program are thankful for the two committees that joined us in this collaboration, all the people who donated food and materials, and all of you who gave of your time to participate. I heard from so many of you that it was wonderful to work side by side with people of all ages, toward a common goal. December has been a great month in our RE program as well – from our Make It / Take It party on December 5 and the Boddhi Day skit presented on December 7 to the Hanukkah parties on December 14 and the Mitten

Tree social justice project on December 21. So many people were involved in our successes! I'm grateful for everyone who helped with Make It / Take It (especially everyone who stayed to clean up the mess!), everyone who donated to our Mitten Tree, Susan Stafford for writing a great skit and the fabulous actors who made Buddha's story come to life, and Debbie Baumel and Joseph Paglisotti for making Potato Latkes and sharing their experiences of Hanukkah. In January, we are wrapping up our unit on our Jewish and Christian Heritage and will be starting a unit on World Religions. Lastly, I have fabulous news to share: ALL of our RE teachers – who had only signed up to teach one semester – have elected to continue teaching through the second semester. This will provide more continuity for our children and youth, and I am thrilled beyond belief that these wonderful volunteers will be with us through May. Please – thank your child's teacher!

### Circle of Concern

Emerson Chapel will be supporting the Circle of Concern food pantry as an ongoing project this church year. ### Green Thoughts

*I read an interesting article today about how we care for loved ones who have died. Did you know that in the US alone, we use 90,000 tons of steel, 30 million board feet of wood, and 827,060 gallons of embalming fluid for burials each year? Embalming fluid is made up of dyes and preservatives as well as toxic ingredients such as phenols and methanol and formaldehyde which pose hazards to mortuary workers and can leach into groundwater or contaminate soil. Embalming is not required in most states unless the deceased will be transported by plane. Cremation has been the only alternative. But cremation can contribute to air pollution by releasing such chemicals as dioxin, sulfur dioxide, hydrochloric acid, and hydrofluoric acid. Traditional cremation also still requires a container that may not be environmentally friendly. More eco-friendly options are available. Biodegradable coffins are made from wicker, bamboo, and other materials, Eternal Reefs will combine cremains with concrete to create artificial ocean reefs. Currently the only green-certified cemetery in Missouri is outside Columbia.*
