KRISTA'S CORNER
MINISTER'S NOTES FROM REV. KRISTA TAVES



**Language of
Reverence**

Finding a common language of reverence can be difficult for Unitarian Universalists. Many come to Unitarian Universalism because they have been wounded by other religions. It may be difficult for them to hear traditional religious language, even in a UU setting, because of this wounding. Others have not experienced this wounding, or if they have, have worked through it and made peace with it, sometimes even reclaiming pieces of the religion they left behind as a way of taking back their power. Many of these are hungry to hear more overtly religious languages in their worship services and religious education classes.

It would be fair to say that I am one of those “reclaiming” Unitarian Universalists. I’ve been wounded by my religious

heritage but have spent considerable time working through that hurt. Many years ago, I started reclaiming much that I left behind. One way I’ve done this is to take language you might hear in more traditional churches and take it back by applying liberal religious values and ideas to its meaning. All the language that we now consider “traditional” was part and parcel of Unitarianism and Universalism in their history. None of this language is really foreign to our traditions. The key is to take back what they’ve meant for us. We’re really reclaiming something that was ours all along.

I’m pretty sure that the knee-jerk reaction many Unitarian Universalists have when exposed to more “traditional” religious language is because more conservative religious people have pretty much been able to define what those words mean. I would be remiss if I said that part of the reason they got away with it is because we let them. We turned away from using religious language and allowed the religious right to claim that language for its own. So now, even the word “religious” has, for many, come to mean closed-

minded, fundamentalist, rigid and conservative.

I am not satisfied with that. Neither are many other Unitarian Universalists. To be liberal or progressive and religious is no oxymoron. More people need to know that. Nor is it un-Unitarian Universalist or even un-Humanist to use words like salvation, forgiveness, sin, revelation, heaven, hell or God. All of these words can be placed within a liberal religious perspective and used to take us deeper into the saving power of Unitarian Universalism.

This month I'd like to explore what it is we all think would make us the *perfect* church. Recently I was sitting with a group and we were talking about the secrets in our lives. One of the examples revolved around someone who had friends with the *perfect* marriage...everyone thought these two had the *perfect* marriage and everyone was totally surprised when one partner left the other...how could that be...they had the *perfect* marriage. They looked *perfect*, had the *perfect* jobs, they were just *perfect* and then it was over.

Perfect...what an interesting concept. We get some idea in our head and even if it isn't what we really want we convince ourselves it will fulfill our every dream. I don't know about you, but that hasn't really been my experience. Emerson is sitting at a cross roads in our life as a congregation. We have our wonderful building, we have an

amazing full time minister in Rev. Krista, we have great programming and we are maturing into a full service church. Here is the big question...what does it mean to be a full service church...more importantly what is our mission as a church? The Crystal Ball Committee will be helping us look at what we think is our vision of *perfect*. Susan Stafford is going to lead this effort with other members of the congregation. When you vision *perfect* for Emerson what do you see and is your vision a viable reality...can your *perfect* mesh with my *perfect*? Treasury Notes

If you have not been at Emerson over the summer, taking a good UU traditional summer "off," please consider getting your pledge caught up (July and August). We are running a little behind in pledge income, and our expenses continue over the summer whether we are there or not.

Beth and I discussed that since MemInfo (our membership software package) allows us to easily get at information for you, she will send a note out in early October to remind everyone what we believe your pledge is, and what you've paid so far in this fiscal year (July 1 to date). I'll send your IRS letters (what you've given in calendar year 2008, but split between two chapel-fiscal years) very early January. Then she'll send another notice out in Spring with where you are in your pledge-to-date (again, in fiscal year, July 1 2008, to date in spring 09). We are hoping that since we have gone to only using MemInfo for pledge information and donations that your IRS statements will be easier to read. Other notes:

1) Financials were given to the Board before the August meeting; please ask me if you have questions. A copy is placed in the folder within a week of the meeting. The budget is being modified to

show the split of the Worship Committee (budget \$1,400) into Worship (\$900 budget) and Music Committee (\$500). No change to the total of budget.

2) The Finance Committee's motion was passed. We will be using a change in Quickbooks to try to help make the accounts work better and more dependably.

3) The Finance Committee is recommending a change to promote transparency: from next month forward, I will take to the Finance meeting all recent church bank statements showing the "as is" balances for the Finance Committee to view. On the bottom of the "as is" you will note (from next month forward) a note that says, "Balances appearing on this statement have been certified by the Finance Committee." This provides another monthly audit, a check on the Treasurer (no offense taken by me, I'm advocating for this process change), and allows the board to know that more eyes saw the statements than just the Treasurer.

4) We finished reviewing a letter from Ken Maag, recent past Audit Committee chair).

6) We are reviewing other church financial software packages (Russ Saphian, Dwight Miller, and Peggy Colwell) and will recommend whether to change our current program

ENGAGING OUR THEOLOGICAL DIVERSITY

Offered by Rev. Taves

In 2005, the Unitarian Universalist Association published "Engaging Our Theological Diversity." This groundbreaking study, written by a team of Unitarian Universalist ministers and lay people, is the result of several years of deliberation, discussion and dialogue in Canada and the United States, and in congregations from coast to coast. It explores Unitarian Universalism at its deepest level, and seeks to hold up what unites us, even as we remain committed to diversity.

This nine-session course will take participants on a journey through Unitarian Universalism's theological landscape and towards the religious values that weave its outward diversity into a unified whole. The class meets on average two Thursdays a month from 7 – 8:30 p.m. Preparation for each session includes 15-30 pages of reading and 15-20 minutes of journaling. A LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR OF RE

Dear Emerson UU RE Families,
Welcome back to a new year of Religious Education for Emerson Chapel's children and youth! Our Sunday schedule has changed very slightly from last year (please see sidebar page 9). Please note that childcare is available for infants and toddlers all morning long, from the beginning of the Worship hour to the end of the Religious Education hour. Our experienced childcare provider, Nicole, is in the Nursery, just off the Hearth Room.

If your children need something to keep their hands busy during the service, check in the Vestibule for clipboards with coloring sheets and crayons. Just return them to the Vestibule when they are done.

About halfway through the service, the children are "sung out" after the Story for All Ages. They come to the Hearth Room with me for Children's Chapel, where we continue the Worship hour with me at a child-friendly level. Children's Chapel is very interactive, and appropriate for children up to about 4th or 5th grade.

At 11:15, the Religious Education hour begins. See sidebar for classrooms, as we have made some changes this year. This

fifteen-minute break allows children to use the restroom before classes start, and grab a snack in the Hearth Room.

For safety reasons, all of our RE teachers are background-checked, and there are always two adults in each classroom. Children through 2nd grade must be picked up after class (promptly at 12:15) by a parent, guardian, or older sibling. Older students will be released without a parent or guardian at 12:15, but not any earlier (to give you time to enjoy your Adult Education session).

By now, you should have gotten an email (or letter or phone call, if no email) from me to confirm your child's registration information (contact info and medical or allergy alerts). If you have not, please contact me and we'll take care of it right away.

Lastly, please do not leave Emerson's grounds while your children are involved in RE without making prior arrangements with me, so that I know who to contact (and how) in case of any emergency. If you are not participating in the Adult RE session, please consider helping in one of our classrooms. I need five assistants from the congregation every Sunday, so there's always a way to help out.

Green Column

I found some suggestions for ways to improve the efficiency of items you already have in your home. (1) Check for leaks and caulk and weatherstrip where needed. (2) Insulate your water heater (3) Get Smart Powerstrips which can reduce the amount of power your electronic appliances require when you are not using them (more on this next month) (4) A Programmable Thermostat can save \$150 a year in energy costs. (5) Consider installing Solar Shades/Blinds. They can reduce your cooling costs by 25% by stopping 90% of the heat before it enters your house. (6) When buying new appliances, buy ones with Energy Star ratings (7) Installing low flow aerating shower-heads can cut your shower water use in half. Four people showering for 5 minutes a day uses 700 gallons of water per week. (8) Get a rain barrel A quarter-inch of rain falling on the average home yields a little over 200 gallons of water. The average family uses about 120 gallons of water for outdoor watering every day. (9) Use electric yard equipment, instead of gas-powered yard equipment. A single gas-mower puts out more pollution than 43 new cars being driven 12,000 miles. Americans use 800 million gallons of gasoline per year to mow their lawns (which works out to be more than 8.8 gallons of gas per year per household). An electric lawnmower uses only about \$3 of electricity per year.
